For the second year in a row, the City of Monrovia has been named as one of five finalists for the prestigious annual Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation's (LAEDC) Eddy Awards. Monrovia was nominated as a finalist for jurisdictions with a population of under 50,000 people, along with Azusa, Duarte, San Gabriel, and Santa Fe Springs. Inglewood Up for Most Business-Friendly City Award

Inglewood is among three finalists for the Most Business-Friendly City award for 2018 presented annually by the Los Angeles Economic Development Corporation. The cities of Inglewood, Rosemead and Whittier are finalists for the population 50,000-and-over category. The winner will be announced Nov. 8 at the Eddy Awards ceremony.

A panel of judges selected the finalists based on economic development efforts within the cities and commitment to creating good jobs, the LAEDC said in a release. Competitive tax rates and fees for businesses and economic incentives for attracting and retaining companies were also considered.



Azusa, Whittier Chosen as Most Business-Friendly Cities by LAEDC

Azusa and Whittier were chosen as the most business-friendly cities in the county for 2018 by the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corp., the nonprofit announced late Nov. 8.

Azusa won for the most business-friendly city with a population under 50,000 and Whittier won for the city with a population over 50,000. The announcement came at the LAEDC's annual awards gala held at the Intercontinental Hotel in downtown.

In evaluating L.A. County cities for these awards, the LAEDC evaluates their commitment to economic development, their efforts to aid business entry, expansion and retention, their business tax rates and fee structures and their use of economic incentives, among other things.

"This year's...awardees are shining examples of government leaders committed to helping employers create good jobs that help raise standards of living in their communities and across our region," Bill Allen, the LAEDC's chief executive, said in the announcement.

Azusa beat out four other finalists in the small city category: Duarte, Monrovia, San Gabriel and Santa Fe Springs. Whittier won over two other finalists in the large city category: Inglewood and Rosemead.

Last year, Arcadia won in the small city category and Downey won in the large city category.

In addition to handing out the most business-friendly city awards, the LAEDC on Nov. 8 also awarded corporate honoree status to American Airlines for its contributions to the regional economy through the growth of its operations at Los Angeles International Airport.

California Polytechnic University at Pomona received the LAEDC's educational honoree award for its efforts to educate economically disadvantaged students. And producer and digital media pioneer Beatriz Acevedo won the LAEDC's individual honoree award for her authentic depictions of Latinos in media.

Whittier has become only the fourth municipality to be named most business friendly city in Los Angeles County twice.

The Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation gave the award to Whittier for cities with a population greater than 50,000 and to Azusa for cities with less than 50,000 residents at the 23rd annual Eddy Awards ceremony held on Thursday.

Whittier previously won the award in 2012. The city was recognized for fostering a business-friendly atmosphere and a strong local economy by offering personalized, cost-effective programs and services for local businesses, according to the release put out by the Economic Development Corporation.

Forget PowerPoint presentations. What's a "City of the Arts" celebration without a creative twist to this year's Santa Clarita State of the City? From tap dancing by Mayor Pro Tem Marsha McLean and a memorable trumpet performance by Councilman Bob Kellar to dropping the mic at the end of Councilman Cameron Smyth's rap, it's safe to say the city did not miss a beat on its current state. The City Council shared Thursday at the Hyatt Regency Valencia with notables and members of the community its accomplishments and what is yet to come for Santa Clarita. "My city colleagues and I, along with our staff, are very passionate and dedicated to making Santa Clarita this amazing city that we live in," Mayor Laurene Weste said to attendees. "Santa Clarita has a very high quality of life," she added. "We pride ourselves in our vast open spaces, our western heritage and our well-managed community. We are known as a creative, artistic community a thriving economic vitality." Through a series of video presentations, each of the five council members discussed a handful of topics highlighting the quality Weste mentioned.

West African drumming troupe Zadonu performs for the attendees, in honor of the theme a "City of the Arts" during the annual State of the City event, which was held at the Hyatt Regency Valencia on Thursday. To fall in line with the "City of the Arts" theme, the mayor reflected on the formation of the Arts Master Plan two years ago, which is helping map out a long-term plan for local arts, entertainment and cultural development. Since then, she said, the city has increased funding for its Arts Grants program by 50 percent, refurbished the Newhall Family Theatre for the Performing Arts and launched santaclaritaarts.com. Weste also spotlighted the city's efforts in reaching nearly 10,000 acres of ensured open space, with the recent addition of the 176-acre San Francisquito Open Space. Financially, she presented, the city is stable thanks to its 2018-19 budget at \$203 million, with a 20 percent reserve. On the topic of roads and transportation, McLean said she was proud that 2.3 million people rode city buses, more than 450,000 used commuter services and nearly 39 miles worth of road improvements had been conducted so far. "More is on the way," she said in regards to road repairs, additional transportation options like the Vista Canyon development's Transit Center and Metrolink Station, as well as a new Saugus library and arts center. Kellar covered the city's advances on public safety, including a 19 percent crime drop, a 12-percent reduction in collisions and those involving cyclists were down 10 percent from last year. "This decrease means that the proactive results taken by the Sheriff's Department are leading to a safer Santa Clarita for all," he said. Councilman Bill Miranda highlighted several city-wide events including the annual Concerts in the Park and the upcoming Santa Clarita Marathon and Light Up Main Street. On film, he mentioned that the city issued more than 300 permits for productions, contributing \$16.9 million to the local economy. Smyth closed by sharing Santa Clarita is "the most business-friendly city," highlighting its Business Incubator, which helps stimulate growth through entrepreneur and economic development. He also discussed employment and the city's efforts on addressing homelessness.

Smyth addresses Santa Clarita unemployment rate at State of City

The annual State of the City events always presents an opportunity to learn more about where you live in recap format, including on the local labor force. On Thursday, Santa Clarita Councilman Cameron Smyth dove into figures that showed a bright future for the local labor force. "Santa Clarita continues to be the most business-friendly city in the Los Angeles County," he said. "Whether that's designing new technology or filming top TV shows or creating world-class experiences, Santa Clarita remains an ideal place to work." The unemployment rate for the city as of July was 5.1 percent, he announced. In March, the Bureau of Labor Statistics reported that 4.20 percent of people in Santa Clarita residents who wanted jobs could not find them, a nearly one-percent increase since July. A similar pattern has been seen across L.A. County, according to the state's Employment Development Department. Still, California's job market has remained robust in multiple cities, including Santa Clarita. By comparison, the city of Delano ranked the highest in unemployment in March this year with 31.9 percent and a 12.2 percent in May 2010 statewide. In the past year, Smyth said, the number of jobs grew by four percent, "which translates to 3,000 more jobs available in Santa Clarita." A good indicator of the strength of an area's job market is the income per capita and the median household income. The city's income per capita is just more than \$35,000, 12 percent higher than the state average, and the median household income is \$85,042, which placed 33 percent above the California average. "Santa Clarita has a very educated community, and it reflects that in the numbers," Smyth said. "We also have a very young working community." He said with new development and current city services, like the Business Incubator, he believes the unemployment rate could drop, "The Needham Ranch Project is going to play a big role because that's going to be adding hundreds of thousands of square feet of industrial space without any housing," he said. The councilman said he would like to see more jobs in the Santa Clarita to help reduce the number of residents traveling outside of the Santa Clarita Valley. "There's no other city that continues to rank amongst the best places to live and work," said Smyth on Thursday.

The city began the evening with a presentation of a new Arcadia tourism video. The presented video is part of a project to promote Arcadia. "The goal really is to bring new business investment to the city," said City Economic Development Analyst Tim Schwehr.

The film focused on Arcadia's tourism attractions from a county-wide standpoint, and also was designed to inform people from outside the area who happen to be travelling in the area. The video highlighted historically important and famous horse racing track, Santa Anita Park, the Westfield Mall (known locally as something of an epicenter of cuisine inspired by the Eastern Hemisphere), the Los Angeles County Arboretum and Botanical Garden, the Arcadia Performing Arts Center, 626 Night Market and more.

"That's a ... good, exciting video we hope will generate some interest in the city and I think a different image than we've had before," said Assistant City Manager Jason Kruckeberg.

The video was produced by Surge Consulting LLC, a company that Arcadia has partnered with in the past to produce films of a similar nature, including the film that was shown showcasing Arcadia in the 2017 Eddy Awards in which Arcadia won the "Most Business-Friendly City Award."

Arcadia Police Chief Bob Guthrie gave a brief report to the Council on crime in the city. One achievement the Police Department has gained in recent weeks was the cracking of codes on cell phones recovered from a captured burglar. The phones showed a wider web of connections between the burglar and a recently-notorious ring of burglars in the county. Some of whom are believed to be the burglars targeting celebrities and making recent county-wide headlines.

The Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation on Thursday announced 10 cities in the county as finalists for its annual most business-friendly city award.

The LAEDC named the cities of Compton, Downey, Inglewood, Lakewood and Long Beach as finalists for cities with at least 68,000 in population.

The economic development nonprofit named Arcadia, Azusa, Monrovia, Rosemead and Santa Fe Springs as finalists among cities with fewer than 68,000 people.

The finalist cities were selected through independent review by a panel of judges based on several criteria, including: commitment to economic development; excellence in programs and services to attract, retain and expand businesses; competitive business tax rates and fee structures; and the availability of economic incentives.

One winner from each category will be announced live at the LAEDC's 22nd annual Eddy Awards dinner Nov. 9 at the new Wilshire Grand tower in downtown.

Last year's winners were Santa Clarita in the large city category and Pico Rivera for small cities.

California and the phrase "business-friendly" might seem like an unlikely match according to some critics, but several Los Angeles County cities have been named finalists for a 2017 Most Business Friendly City award.

The award is given out each year by the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corp. — one for a city with a population of 68,000 or more, and another for a city with fewer residents.

Long Beach, Compton, Downey, Inglewood and Lakewood are finalists in the bigger category, while Arcadia, Azusa, Monrovia, Rosemead and Santa Fe Springs are in the running for cities with fewer than 68,000 people.

They were selected through independent review by a panel of judges based on a variety of factors, including competitive business tax rates and fee structures, commitment to economic development, and availability of economic incentives.

The winners will be announced Nov. 9 at the LAEDC's 22nd annual Eddy Awards at the Intercontinental Hotel in downtown Los Angeles. The awards recognize leadership in economic development in business, education and government throughout L.A. County.

The judges described Long Beach as "a forward-thinking city that is committed to creating economic opportunities for workers, investors, and entrepreneurs."

Randy Gordon, president and CEO of the Long Beach Area Chamber of Commerce, doesn't dispute that.

"I've been president and CEO of the chamber for 23 years, and I've never seen so many cranes in operation," he said. "We have a new city hall and civic center development with a new port administration office. That's a \$550 million project that will be completed in 2020. We also have a new \$1.4 billion bridge at the port that's also supposed to be completed in 2020. It will be much higher than the current bridge, which is falling apart. It will allow bigger ships with up to 18,000 TEUs, or 20-foot equivalent units — a shipping industry standard to measure volumes — to go under the bridge."

Gordon said the project has been a shot in the arm for the city, creating 10,000 jobs over its 10-year construction phase.

"We also have new residential development with at least 2,000 condos and apartments being built, and a new outdoor shopping center called The Exchange that will begin development very soon," he said. "With all of this building going on, I guess we must be pretty business-friendly."

Santa Fe Springs is described as "ready for business" and the Economic Development Corp. notes that more than 60 percent of the city is zoned for retail, office and industrial uses. Residents and developers also benefit from low property taxes and permit fees.

"We are known for our business-friendliness," said Wayne Morrell, the city's director of planning. "The slogan of our former city manager Thaddeus McCormick was, 'We are in the approval business and we find a way to say yes.' We try to live by that slogan."

Barbara Levine, a senior regional manager with the Economic Development Corp., maintains an office in Santa Fe Springs to help spur economic development there.

"Barbara is able to meet with prospective businesses and inform them of all the resources we can access with tax incentives and rebates," Morrell said. "We have permit streamlining and expedited plan review. Workers comp is a big issue in California and Barbara works with companies to provide a free audit process that shows them how they can realize savings in that area."

The judges deemed Monrovia "a dynamic community" blending small-town charm with big-city amenities and "a world-class place to do business."

Monrovia Mayor Tom Adams says that's an apt description.

"Monrovia used to make this list, but then we kind of fell away from it," he said. "But now we're back on it. I met recently with the head of WorleyParsons (an Australian engineering company servicing the natural resources and energy sectors) and they have closed down all of their other West Coast operations and channeled it all here. They can see that we are taking care of all of their infrastructure needs, but I think they can also see our attitude. Businesses are smart enough to know where they are wanted or not wanted."

The Eddy Awards will also celebrate three corporate and education honorees: Mark Suster, a managing partner with Upfront Ventures, a Los Angeles-based venture capital firm; Cedars-Sinai Medical Center, a nonprofit hospital and academic health science center in Los Angeles; and Cal State L.A.







Business is booming in awardwinning Santa Clarita

Santa Clarita students have more job opportunities than they realize, especially in high-profile, high-paying industries like entertainment and technology.

The city isn't just a quiet hometown-it's also an investment and business haven. In fact, Santa Clarita showcased its success on Nov. 10, 2016 at the 21st annual Eddy Awards when it was recognized as the most businessfriendly city in L.A. County with a population over 68,000.

Finalists for this award included the cities of Compton, Downey, Santa Clarita, Long Beach and Lakewood, with Santa Clarita taking home this prestigious honor.

The Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation's annual Eddy Awards promotes and recognizes leadership in economic development in government and business within L.A. County and focuses on expanding shared prosperity for its communities and residents.

A panel of blue ribbon judges selects the winner through various factors including, demonstrating a priority commitment to economic development, facilitating business entry, retention and expansion through programs and services, competitive business fee structures and tax rates, availability of economic incentives and having regular communication with their business clients.

Being granted this award will "Be a critical component of our efforts to attract businesses to the Santa Clarita Valley, especially those who are frustrated in other cities and who might otherwise consider relocating outside of California," said president and CEO of the Santa Clarita Valley Economic Development Corporation, Holly Schroeder.

"Receiving this badge of honor shows that the city is thinking proactively," said LAEDC's Director of Public Relations, Lawren Markle.

"The City of Santa Clarita maintains fiscal discipline and focuses its budget on key investments that meet community needs, they focus on maintaining and improving our modern infrastructure. It also has a balanced budget and a reserve fund, which means that the city will not be likely to raise taxes or fees in the foreseeable future.

"This is good news for local businesses who can make their business plans with greater certainty," said Schroeder.

Having this prestige shows that Santa Clarita is "Tuned in on what skills are needed in job applicants to fill positions in their local workforce," said Markle.



business means more jobs and more room for economic growth within the community.

The topic of unemployment often comes up during the discussion of jobs, but Santa Clarita has one of the lowest unemployment rates at 4.6 percent compared to Los Angeles at 5.4 percent, Palmdale at 6.8 percent and Glendale at 4.9 percent. According to the November Economic Screenshot from the SCVEDC, the current unemployment rate in Santa Clarita is 15 percent lower than the rate recorded in October of 2015.

Santa Clarita is home to booming industries including, but not limited to technology, entertainment, biomedical and aerospace manufacturing.

"SCV is bucking statewide trends and in the past few years is showing growth in both manufacturing generally and aerospace specifically, statewide jobs in these sectors are declining," said Schroeder.

Even though business is still new within the IT sector, it is growing rapidly. On Nov. 30, Scorpion Internet Marketing held the groundbreaking for its new headquarters right here in SCV.

And even if you aren't technologically savvy, "The filming/digital media sector continues to thrive," said Schroeder.

"Education is big out here as well when it comes to careers, three out of the five largest employers in SCV are William S Hart Union School District, Saugus Union School District, and COC," said COC Job Developer James Morris.

"SCV is a commuter city, lots of people may leave for work but their families are still here and need to be taken care of. Government is always big, along with travel, and healthcare too," said Morris.

Since COC is primarily a two-year institution besides offering only associates degrees they offer many vocational certificates that increase earnings directly, and help students get jobs. Completing a certificate

program or receiving an associate's degree can help students find a job quicker for they already have credited knowledge pertaining to a certain field.

Judges from the Eddy Awards even noted the comprehensive programs targeting industry incentives and strong partnership with College of the Canyons workforce development.

And furthering the advantages of COC students, America's Job Center of California is conveniently located in the University Center on campus.

The services that the center offers include current job listings, workforce preparation such as resume assistance, training and education, job referrals and workshops, internship information, labor market information and even an out of area job search.

"Internships and job shadowing are also important for students because you find out if you really like the day-to-day grind of that career," said Morris. "And just because you major in something it doesn't mean you will always have to work in that field, you can keep your options open to what works best for you."

The Small Business Development center also calls COC home. On Nov, 9 at the California SBDC Professional Development Conference the center was named the 2016 top performing small business development center within the Los Angeles Regional Network, surpassing the region's seven other centers.

It can be tough to get a job during or after college, but in Santa Clarita there will always be some opportunity knocking.

"For all the students and local businesses out there, the most important thing is to make sure that you never limit yourself," said Morris.



PICO RIVERA >> A decision to add three economic development positions to the budget apparently helped the city win - after finishing the last five years as finalists - the "most business-friendly city" award from the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corp.

Pico Rivera won the award for cities with a population of less than 68,000. Santa Clarita won the same award for cities with a higher population than 68,000.

"The panel of judges noted that Pico Rivera's new, dedicated economic development division, which was created in 2016 with three full-time staff, is a significant commitment to economic vitality and job opportunity," said a press release from the Economic Development Corp.

The three new staffers hired are helping the city attract and retain business, said Julia Gonzalez, deputy director for the city's Community Development Department.

Pico Rivera also was credited with looking at every aspect of delivery of services and asking how it adds value and benefits residents and businesses.

Gonzalez said city leaders are excited about finally winning the award.

"We're happy now that the whole county knows we are the most business friendly city," she said.

Gonzalez said Pico Rivera also works hard to expedite and fast track the obtaining of various permits.

Pico Rivera Mayor David Armenta predicted the award will help the city.

"Businesses are going to look at us more seriously," Armenta said. "Well have a lot of opportunity to bring in new businesses."

The award also is a reflection of the city's practices, he said.

"When people come in to City Hall, I don't care if it's for a water board, or to do a plan or to see what the city is all about, they're greeted first with a smile and then directed where to go," Armenta said. "We treat them like family."

Pico Rivera isn't the first Whittier-area city to win the award.

La Mirada won it for smaller cities in 2013, while Whittier won it for larger cities in 2012.

After winning, cities can't apply for five years.

economic engine of Los Angeles.

That's why the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation last week presented CSUN with its 2015 Eddy Award, which honors leading contributors to local economy and those who create good jobs.

Other recipients included Snapchat CEO Evan Spiegel and Los Angeles-based CBRE Group, Inc., the world's largest commercial real estate services and investment firm, as well as the cities of Palmdale and El Segundo. The awards were formally presented Thursday at a gala held at the Beverly Hilton Hotel.

University partnerships in the community include one with L.A. Cleantech Incubator to foster entrepreneurship, business formation and job creation. "It really is something that distinguishes us from other cities," Lanzafame said. "...that single point of contact, somebody that you can go to navigate through the city system is critically important."

Glendale was previously nominated for the Eddy in 2008, 2011 and 2012.

Lanzafame said the city likely wouldn't be eligible for another nomination for at least five years.

Santa Monica Vies Again for Title of County's Most Business-Friendly City

October 17, 2013 -- For the second year in a row, Santa Monica is in the running to earn the title of "Most Business-Friendly" city in Los Angeles County.

Santa Monica will compete against four other cities -- Paramount, Glendora, Lancaster and Pico Rivera -- with populations over 50,000 for the title, bestowed by the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation at the 18th Annual Eddy Awards next month.

"We'll hear people sometimes say that it's hard to do business in Santa Monica, but this points out that it's not," said Mayor Pam O'Connor. "Yes, we have standards, but businesses want to be here."

She said that one thing that makes Santa Monica attractive to businesses is the "fair, comprehensible" process the City has for prospective business owners.

That, combined with state-of-the-art amenities like a dark fiber broadband network installed throughout the city, invite small and large businesses alike to set up shop here, she said.

"We have a global, mobile society," she said. "Those kind of external changes have changed the world. It's important to be nimble and responsive to those changes." Carl Hansen, director of government affairs for the Chamber of Commerce, said, "The Chamber is super excited about it."

He credited the close working relationship the Chamber has with City staff with contributing to Santa Monica's success.

Each year since 2006, the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation has honored one of the County's 88 cities for its work supporting the economic growth of the Los Angeles region.

Last year, Santa Monica made it to the finals for the first time, but eventually lost out to Whittier in East Los Angeles. That same year, the City of Duarte triumphed among those cities with less than 60,000 residents.

Other past winners in the population of 60,000 and up category include Long Beach in 2009, Alhambra in 2010 and West Covina in 2011.

The competition is just one way that the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corporation shores up the region's economic vitality, which officials estimate generated more than \$500 billion in economic activity in 2008.

In 2009, the Corporation took the lead in drafting the Los Angeles County Strategic Plan for Economic Development.

Within the plan, now in its third year of implementation, County officials call for municipalities to include economic development in their general plans, adopt "clear, reasonable and predictable processes for the development of land" and educate stakeholders on the value of promoting business-friendly environments.



MUSEUM PROPOSAL:

Billionaire art collector and philanthropist Eli Broad said he wants to build a public museum in Beverly Hills. The gallery would display works from his charitable foundation and personal collection, according to a letter



by a Broad representative sent to Beverly Hills City Manager Roderick Wood. The proposal includes offices for Broad's art foundation, which along with another Broad foundation has assets of \$2.5 billion. The proposed museum would be near the corner of Santa Monica and Wilshire boulevards, where a Starbucks Corp. coffee shop is now housed.

BANK WARNING:

Alliance Bancshares California said it could be placed into government receivership if it cannot raise additional capital. The Culver Citybased parent of Alliance Bank, which has \$1.1 billion in assets and six local

branches, was hurt by construction loans gone bad, particularly for tract projects and single homes. The bank said it applied for funds under the U.S. Treasury Department's rescue program, but regulators indicated the application would not be accepted except in connection with a merger or capital financing. Alliance said it is considering those options. The bank last week reported a third quarter net loss of \$13.9 million compared with earnings of \$2 million for the same period last year.

RATE HIKE: State Compensation Insurance Fund, the state's largest workers' compensation insurer, said it will hike employer premiums an average of 9 percent starting Jan. 1. The hike is expected to slam the insurer of last resort's more than 200,000 employer policyholders amid a worsening economy. Some policyholders in high-risk industries or with a bad claims history can expect rate hikes well into the double digits. State Fund, a San Francisco-based quasipublic organization, filed its first rate increase in five years shortly after state Insurance Commissioner Steve Poizner recommended a 5 percent increase in premiums because of rising medical costs.

FRIENDLY PLACES:

Santa Clarita and Vernon were named Los Angeles County's most business-friendly cities by the Los Angeles County Economic Development Corp. LAEDC officials selected Santa Clarita as the large-city winner for its expedited permit processing, site selection assistance, lack of a utility tax and its layout of industry clusters. Vernon was honored in the small-city category for its low electric utility rates, a one-stop service counter for business at City Hall and the work of its redevelopment agency. LAEDC chose the two cities from among 10 finalists and made the announcement at its annual Eddy Awards ceremo-



ny. Also receiving awards were Rick Caruso, shopping center developer, and Anne Sweeney, president of Walt Disney Co.'s ABC Network Television unit.

UNION CONTRACT:

The International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees' agreement to a three-year

contract with the major Hollywood studios puts further pressure on the Screen Actors Guild, which continues to hold out for a better deal on revenue related to new media. IATSE, which represents 35,000 crafts employees, is the fifth union this year to strike a deal with the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers. The contract is similar to pacts negotiated by writers, directors and a union representing broadcast artists. Also last week, SAG's negotiating committee resumed the first face-to-face meetings with studio representatives in four months.

STUDY SUSPENDED:

Amgen Inc. and Japanese partner Takeda Pharmaceutical Co. said they have suspended a clinical trial of their experimental cancer drug motesanib after seeing a trend of higher deaths among lung cancer patients getting the drug, compared with those receiving a placebo. Amgen had hoped to market motesanib for use with chemotherapy to treat a type of lung cancer. The Thousand Oaks biotech company noted similar death risks had been seen in other drugs in the same class as motesanib, which is designed to block a protein involved in the growth of blood vessels that feed tumors.

NASDAQ WARNING: SouthWest Water Co. said it received a deficiency letter
