State Announces Funding to Support Sustainable and Resilient Regional Economies Across California

- 13 economic development entities known as High Road Transition Collaboratives will receive \$5 million each to develop roadmaps, including a strategy and recommended series of investments, for their region. Following this planning phase, the program's implementation phase will begin in 2023 and provide \$500 million to fund projects identified by the High Road Transition Collaboratives.
- High Road Transition Collaboratives represent California's 13 distinct regional economies and bring together diverse community, labor, industry, and business interests. The announcement includes 11 of the 13 awardees. Awardees were selected through a competitive bidding process based on their readiness and commitment to conduct inclusive planning processes that engage various community groups, including voices that have been traditionally left out of economic planning.

Important Planning Phase Dates noted in CERF SFP

Now

- Contracting with State of California and Fiscal Agents
- Preparations for hiring support staff
- The HRTC will need to review guidelines proposed by the state

Two Months

Awardees must submit the **Planning Phase Plan within the first two months** of the Planning Phase (SFP Page 60) . Includes:

- The structure of the HRTCs, including the **finalized governance structure (OE & Governance will need collaboration coupled with input from the HRTC).**
- The plans with estimated expenses for the following: Convening the Collaboratives and an inclusive regional planning process and developing a comprehensive plan for the region's High Road transition. This includes a plan and timeline for **conducting the analyses and developing the roadmap** defined in this solicitation.

March 31, 2023

Awardees must submit the **Regional summary report** (SFP Page 12/60) . The Regional Plan includes two parts:

- Part 1 - **Snapshot of socio-economic conditions (Research)** in the region: mapping stakeholders, providing a regional summary, and conducting analyses.
- Part 2 - **Establish a forward-looking economic development and transition roadmap.**

Timeline

Planning Phase Plan:

Awardees must submit a report laying out:

- a. The structure of the HRTCs, including the governance structure, and
- b. The plans with estimated expenses for the following:
 - i. Convening the Collaboratives and an inclusive regional planning process
 - ii. Developing a comprehensive plan for the region's High Road transition.

(This includes a plan and timeline for conducting the analyses and developing the roadmap defined in this solicitation.)




Awardees must submit the Planning Phase Plan within the first two months of the Planning Phase.

Quarter One:

- RFPs released for CERF Research and Hub leads; contract with Regional Convener by 10/15/22
- Contracts with Research and Hub leads
- Develop position descriptions and hire fiscal agent and regional convener program staff
- Complete Process Mapping for outreach and engagement
- Prepare outreach materials/website
- Complete subgroup mapping, begin convening subgroup partners
- Develop micro and subgrant processes and issue RFPs
- Submit monthly progress and budget reports at the end of each month
- Submit Planning Phase Plan within the first two months of executing agreements with the State and the regional convener.

The Community Economic Resilience Fund (CERF) was created to promote a sustainable and equitable recovery from the distress of COVID-19 by supporting new plans and strategies to diversify local economies and develop solutions that create high-quality, broadly accessible jobs for all Californians.

To achieve this goal, the State will allocate \$600 million across thirteen designated regions to fund the development of specific economic development strategies that support the creation of quality jobs and equal access to economic opportunities.
